Session 7A – The Place Where God Dwells – Part 2

I. GOD HEARS THE PRAYERS OF HIS PEOPLE (Ex. 30:1-10, 34-38; 37:25-29)

The altar of incense \rightarrow acacia wood / gold \rightarrow 1.5' square / 3' high \rightarrow Holy Place.

Gold rim ("crown") \rightarrow golden "horns" \rightarrow

Before the veil \rightarrow separated Holy of Holies from Holy Place \rightarrow priest burned incense \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Burning incense \rightarrow picture of prayer \rightarrow (Rev. 5:8; 8:3-4)

 \rightarrow Call for a time of prayer \rightarrow (Luke 1:8-10)

The fire \rightarrow from the brazen altar \rightarrow (Lev. 16:12-13; Num. 16:46)

Coldhearted praying \rightarrow not effective praying \rightarrow (James 5:16)

 \rightarrow The priest \rightarrow the right fire \rightarrow the prescribed mixture of spices \rightarrow (Ex. 30:34-38)

Nadab and Abihu \rightarrow "false fire" \rightarrow killed \rightarrow (Lev. 10)

Prayer isn't \rightarrow jumble of words \rightarrow

The "ingredients" of prayer \rightarrow adoration, confession, thanksgiving, petition, submission (1 Tim. 2:1; Phil. 4:6) \rightarrow a pattern (Matt. 6:5-15) \rightarrow

Christ on the cross \rightarrow presence of God \rightarrow present worship and petitions \rightarrow (Heb. 10:19-25)

Priest-King → Jesus Christ, → interceding continually for us (Rom. 8:33-34; Heb. 4:14-16; 7:19-28) → Holy Spirit intercedes (Rom. 8:26-27) →

→ "pray without ceasing" (1 Thess. 5:17) →

The priests warned \rightarrow golden altar only burning incense (Ex. 30:9) \rightarrow no substitutes for prayer \rightarrow

The golden altar \rightarrow (James 4:1-4; 1 John 5:14-15) \rightarrow adoring Him and praying \rightarrow "Your will be done"

The special incense \rightarrow "salted" (Ex. 30:35) \rightarrow symbol of purity \rightarrow covenant relationship (Lev. 2:13) (*Ps. 66:18*)

 \rightarrow Lift up "holy hands" \rightarrow remove "anger or disputing" from our hearts (1 Tim. 2:8)

Day of Atonement \rightarrow incense altar \rightarrow ceremonially (Ex. 30:10)

II. GOD RECEIVES HIS PEOPLE'S SACRIFICES (Ex. 27:1-8; 38:1-7)

The tabernacle \rightarrow a white linen fence \rightarrow 150' long and 75' wide \rightarrow surrounded the tabernacle \rightarrow

The tabernacle proper \rightarrow west end \rightarrow 30' entrance \rightarrow east end \rightarrow

Priests met the people \rightarrow

The worshipper \rightarrow hand on the animal's head (Lev. 1:1-9) \rightarrow priest \rightarrow slay the animal \rightarrow offer it \rightarrow Lev. 1-7

Jesus the only door (John 10:9) \rightarrow the only way to God (John 14:6) \rightarrow

Peter's testimony \rightarrow Acts 4:12 \rightarrow

Pluralistic society \rightarrow many ways to God \rightarrow (Prov. 14:12; 16:25; Matt. 7:13-27)

The brazen altar \rightarrow hollow "box" $\rightarrow~$ 7.5' wide / 4.5' high $\rightarrow~$ acacia wood covered with bronze $\rightarrow~$

Bronze \rightarrow judgment (Num. 21:4-9; Deut. 28:23; Rev. 1:15)

 \rightarrow Inside the "box" \rightarrow bronze grating \rightarrow fire burning (Lev. 6:8-13) \rightarrow

Priests \rightarrow carried ashes outside the camp \rightarrow (Lev. 1:16; 4:12; 6:10-11)

 \rightarrow The brazen altar \rightarrow place of bloodshed and death \rightarrow (Heb. 9:22)

The presence of God \rightarrow began at the brazen altar \rightarrow

→ The brazen altar → to Calvary → the Son of God died (Matt. 26:26-28; John 1:29; 3:14-16; Rom. 5:8; 1 Peter 2:24)

Each morning \rightarrow priests offer a burnt offering on the brazen altar (Ex. 29:42-43) \rightarrow total dedication (Lev. 1) \rightarrow

 \rightarrow "Living sacrifices" (Rom. 12:1-2)

The death of Jesus Christ \rightarrow took care of the sin problem (Heb. 9:25-28) \rightarrow

The Lord's Supper \rightarrow reminder of His sacrifice \rightarrow

The "altar" \rightarrow Jesus Christ Himself (Heb. 13:10; Luke 24:39; John 20:20)

A holy priesthood \rightarrow believers \rightarrow (1 Peter 2:5) \rightarrow

We present to Him \rightarrow bodies (Rom. 12:1-2) \rightarrow material wealth (Phil. 4:18) \rightarrow praise and good works (Heb. 13:15-16) \rightarrow broken heart (Ps. 51:17)

III. GOD WANTS HIS PEOPLE TO BE CLEAN (Ex. 30:17-21; 38:8)

Tabernacle courtyard $\rightarrow\,$ the laver $\rightarrow\,$ priests and Levites $\rightarrow\,$ wash their hands and feet $\rightarrow\,$

No washing \rightarrow in danger of death \rightarrow

In Scripture → water for drinking → picture of the Spirit of God (John 7:37-39) → → water for washing → picture of the Word of God (Ps. 119:9; John 15:3; Eph. 5:25-27) The laver → the Word of God → cleanses (John 17:17)

The laver \rightarrow bronze mirrors (Ex. 38:8) \rightarrow typifies God's Word \rightarrow the Word of God \rightarrow compared to a mirror (James 1:22-26; 2 Cor. 3:18)

Old Testament \rightarrow three ways to ceremonial cleansing \rightarrow by water, by fire, by blood \rightarrow

Cleansed from the guilt of sin \rightarrow blood of Jesus Christ \rightarrow (1 John 1:5-2:2)

Disobey God \rightarrow our hearts and minds defiled by sin (see Ps. 51) \rightarrow "washing of water by the word" (Eph. 5:26) \rightarrow restores us

Old Testament priests \rightarrow defiled \rightarrow by serving God \rightarrow

Feet became dirty \rightarrow hands were defiled \rightarrow needed constant cleansing \rightarrow

Jesus \rightarrow taught His disciples \rightarrow by washing their feet (John 13:1-15)

Trust Christ \rightarrow washed all over (Jn. 13:10; 1 Cor. 6:9-11) \rightarrow

Not cleansed \rightarrow no fellowship with the Lord (John 13:8) \rightarrow

David \rightarrow "Wash me" (Ps. 51:2, 7) \rightarrow God answered prayer (2 Sam. 12:13)

Isaiah \rightarrow "Wash and make yourselves clean" (Isa. 1:16) \rightarrow

Paul \rightarrow "Let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God" (2 Cor. 7:1)

IV. GOD WANTS HIS PEOPLE TO APPRECIATE AND ENJOY HIS BLESSINGS (Ex. 26:1-37; 27:9-19; 36:8-38; 38:9-20)

A. Strength

A solid structure \rightarrow beautiful curtains \rightarrow

20 boards \rightarrow acacia wood \rightarrow 15' high / 27" wide \rightarrow overlaid with gold \rightarrow north and south walls \rightarrow 8 similar boards \rightarrow west wall

Two silver bases \rightarrow

48 boards \rightarrow 4 long rods (crossbars) \rightarrow through golden rings \rightarrow

The east end \rightarrow 5 posts \rightarrow a linen curtain \rightarrow blue, purple, and scarlet yarn \rightarrow door into the Holy Place \rightarrow

B. Beauty

Gold, blue, purple, scarlet, and white \rightarrow major colors \rightarrow

Linen fence \rightarrow white \rightarrow the holiness of God \rightarrow

30' gate \rightarrow east end \rightarrow embroidered \rightarrow blue, purple, and scarlet \rightarrow white background \rightarrow

Blue \rightarrow sky \rightarrow God of heaven \rightarrow

Purple \rightarrow royal color \rightarrow the King \rightarrow

Scarlet \rightarrow blood / sacrifice \rightarrow

Holy Place and Holy of Holies \rightarrow four different coverings (curtains) \rightarrow

Looking at the tabernacle \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Leather-like outmost covering \rightarrow badgers' skins \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Tabernacle proper / its furnishings \rightarrow

Beneath protective covering \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Curtain of rams' skins dyed red \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Fabric woven of goats' hair \rightarrow black \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Beautiful covering \rightarrow fine linen embroidered with cherubim in blue, purple, and scarlet

Holy Place \rightarrow Holy of Holies \rightarrow the veil \rightarrow golden clasps \rightarrow four pillars \rightarrow embroidered with cherubim \rightarrow white, scarlet, blue, and purple

Hebrews 10:20 \rightarrow this veil typifies the body of Christ \rightarrow

The veil of the temple \rightarrow torn from top to bottom (Mark 15:38)

A parallel \rightarrow four gospels \rightarrow four pillars \rightarrow four colors

 $Purple \rightarrow$ royalty \rightarrow Matthew \rightarrow the King

Scarlet \rightarrow sacrifice \rightarrow Mark \rightarrow the Suffering Servant

White \rightarrow perfect Son of Man \rightarrow Luke

Blue \rightarrow heaven \rightarrow John \rightarrow the Son of God \rightarrow

C. Appreciation

The tabernacle appeared common to outsiders $\rightarrow\,$ costly and beautiful $\rightarrow\,$ spoke of the Savior $\rightarrow\,$

Old Testament→ treasures in God's house

David's testimony \rightarrow

Psalm 27:4 One thing have I desired of the LORD, that will I seek after: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the LORD, and to inquire in his temple.

Psalm 26:8 LORD, I have loved the habitation of Your house, and the place where Your glory dwells.

The sons of Korah \rightarrow

Psalm 84:1-2, 4 How lovely is Your tabernacle, O LORD of hosts! My soul longs, yes, even faints for the courts of the LORD; my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God. ... Blessed are those who dwell in Your house; they will still be praising You.

Old Testament believers \rightarrow the tabernacle \rightarrow the temple \rightarrow God's people \rightarrow today \rightarrow Jesus Christ

Furnishings / ceremonies \rightarrow point to Christ \rightarrow aspects of His character \rightarrow salvation \rightarrow

Spiritual needs met \rightarrow provisions of the tabernacle \rightarrow

 \rightarrow Jesus Christ (2 Peter 1:3)

All fullness in Christ (Col. 1:19) \rightarrow all the fullness of the Godhead (Col. 2:9)

In Christ \rightarrow "hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge" (Col. 2:3)

We must \rightarrow "seek those things which are above, where Christ is, sitting at the right hand of God" (Col. 3:1)

In Christ \rightarrow every spiritual blessing (Eph. 1:3) \rightarrow

 \rightarrow The holy sanctuary \rightarrow source of food and drink

"Both high and low among men find refuge in the shadow of your wings [the Holy of Holies]. They feast on the abundance of your house." (Ps. 36:7–8)

Session 7B – Exodus and Prayer

Incense:

Ps. 141:2 says "May my prayer be set before you lie incense; may the lifting up of my hand be like the evening sacrifice."

 \rightarrow in scripture \rightarrow incense, the cloud of incense coming from the altar, is a picture of our prayer before God.

Revelation

→ John paints scene of heaven where the true golden altar of incense is visible. → prayers of the saints are offered like incense to God, a sweet aroma pleasing to Him.

I. General types of prayer:

- 1. Prayer of worship/adoration (Heb. 13:15; Rev. 4:11; Ps. 148:13)
- 2. Prayer of thanksgiving (Ps. 100:4; Phil. 4:6)
- 3. Prayer of faith (James 5:13-16)
- 4. Prayer of intercession (Daniel 9:1-27; Col. 1:9-12; 1 Tim. 2:1)
- 5. Corporate prayer (Acts 12:5-18)
- 6. <u>Prayer of consecration</u> (Rom. 12:1)
- 7. Prayer of Blessing (Phil. 1:9-11; Num. 6)

II. <u>Exodus portrays prayer as it is used in a time of suffering, crisis, and deliverance.</u>

 \rightarrow 1 petition, 3 intercessions, 2 prayers of praise, and one blessing

A. Petition:

Exodus 2:23

- B. Intercession
 - 1. Ex. 8:8-9,12 2. Ex. 9:28-29, 33 3. Ex. 10:16-18

C. Prayer of Praise

1. Exodus 15:1-18

(Table 1)

Then Moses and the people of Israel sang this song to the Lord:

"I will sing to the Lord, for he has triumphed gloriously; he has hurled both horse and rider into the sea.
² The Lord is my strength and my song; he has given me victory.
This is my God, and I will praise him my father's God, and I will exalt him!

(Table 2)

 ³ The Lord is a warrior; Yahweh is his name!
 ⁴ Pharaoh's chariots and army he has hurled into the sea.
 The finest of Pharaoh's officers are drowned in the Red Sea.

⁵ The deep waters gushed over them; they sank to the bottom like a stone.
⁶ "Your right hand, O Lord, is glorious in power.

¹⁴ The peoples hear and tremble; anguish grips those who live in Philistia.

All who live in Canaan melt away;

¹⁶ terror and dread fall upon them.

The power of your arm

makes them lifeless as stone

until your people pass by, O Lord,

until the people you purchased pass by.

D. Blessing:

Exodus 18:10

"Praise the Lord," Jethro said, "for he has rescued you from the Egyptians and from Pharaoh. Yes, he has rescued Israel from the powerful hand of Egypt!"

Flow of a prayer life:

1. Petition \rightarrow intercession \rightarrow praise \rightarrow blessing

III. Application of the prayer form in Exodus:

The Collect:

 \rightarrow a classic form for prayer \rightarrow appeared in medieval times

- 1) Naming God
- 2) Tells what God does that makes that name appropriate
- 3) Make a petition or request of God
- 4) Reason for request
- 5) Expression of praise

\rightarrow An Example:

- 1. Jehovah Jireh, God Provider
- 2. You provided manna and quail for the Israelites in the desert
- 3. I am in need of a job. Would you help me to find one?
- 4. I desire to provide for my family, to be generous and share what I have with those in need, and honor you by being a good steward of your blessings.
- 5. You have always been faithful to provide, I know you will be faithful again.

- 9. What is personally relevant in what you've learned about the incense, the altar, the laver, or the tabernacle's construction?
